Report from the Vice-President

Tuesday Plenary Session



Dr. Ahmed K. Noor

Dr. Noor, Old Dominion University.

Dr. Noor's remarks on Advanced Engineering Environments proved to be both thought provoking and entertaining. It was refreshing to see a presentation that didn't rely on Microsoft PowerPoint to be interesting and exciting.

Dr. Noor began the talk with a look at some Future Complex Systems, which included transportation using vehicles straight

from the Jetson's and nano-sensors the size of butterflies for remote sensing applications.

He also provided a look at new Autonomic Computing Environments being developed with self-managing and self-optimizing systems (no IT Department required) and showed possible multi-modal interfaces with mixed reality displays using tele-immersion (you inside the 3-D model space not just viewing the 3-D model space).

These systems included an intelligent software agent, or what I would describe as a 'cyber friend', who looked a little bit like Lara Croft from the Tomb Raider video game that appears on the workstation screen in place of the GUI interfaces and dialogue boxes we presently use. The system is voice command driven, so you simply tell Lara Croft to go retrieve your data and display it for you.

His segment on Emotionally Aware Computing Systems featured a computer mouse that monitors your heart rate and body temperature and again the cyber version of Lara Croft 'relax you seem stressed' evoked an enthusiastic responses from the audience, followed by more laughter when Lara scolds you for making mistakes at the workstation.

Post-Fire Characterization of the Land Surface and Vegetation Using Imaging Spectroscopy Data for Cerro Grande NM and Left Hand Creek WY

Historically, fire has been among the dominant disturbances in the Rocky Mountain Region of the U.S. Recent occurrences of large wildfires, due in part to the increased abundance of fuels resulting from the past century of wildfire suppression, necessitate that resource managers acquire information on the post-fire state of the land surface to plan erosion hazard mitigation strategies and to guide re-vegetation efforts. This paper reports on the spectroscopic analysis of remotely sensed data collected post-wildfire. Two areas were studied: 1) the May 2000 Cerro Grande fire in Los Alamos NM, and the Left Hand Creek BLM area in Central Wyoming, which has been subject to wild fires in 2000 and 2001. AVIRIS data collected on September 4, 2000, over the Cerro Grande fire site were atmospherically corrected and converted to reflectance using a single ground calibration site. The spectral signatures in these data were examined in relation to known spectral responses of vegetation, mineral and post-fire ash materials. The results of this study indicate that the presence of ash covered surfaces and bare soil/bedrock surfaces can be identified and mapped. Variations in vegetation reflectance arising from chlorophyll and lignin/cellulose absorption features indicate that vegetation within fire perimeters can potentially be discriminated into unburned vegetation, fire-killed nonphotosynthetic needles/leaves, and regenerated vegetation. Hymap imaging spectrometer data over the Left Hand Creek study site were collected on July 2, 2002. In conjunction with the remote sensing data collection, field measurements of vegetation reflectance and surveys of plant species composition were made for 33 sites within the study area. Measurements of vegetation cover and species composition were made in order to assess the impact of fire on vegetation regeneration in this sagebrush ecosystem. Ongoing efforts in both study areas seek to utilize the post-fire characterization of the land surface in conjunction with in situ studies of erosion and vegetation regrowth to develop predictive models of landscape recovery from wildland and prescribed fires.




News From the SMSU Student Chapter






Gasherbrum II: A Journey to 26,360 Feet in the Karakoram
